

Not As Far Away As You Think; Alaska On My Mind Day One

In June 1997 I took my first ride to Alaska. I had purchased my ride, a 1977 BMW R100/7 in 1994 with 34,000 mile on the odometer. It was something of a barn loft rescue. The previous owner had put about thousand dollars into the bike just to get it to a saleable condition. Over the next few years I continued to tinker with the bike's mechanics and my thoughts of Alaska began to grow. By spring 1997 the bike had 56,000 miles on the odometer and it was in good reliable mechanical condition. Cosmetically it was still challenged. I thought, this is as good a time as any to take the paint chipping challenge of the ALCAN Highway. Just because I am who I am, I sweetened the challenge by buying Jen, my 19-year-old daughter, airfare to arrive in Anchorage 8 days after my starting date. So let me see, 3,600 miles divided by 8 days, late spring in the Pacific northwest, mostly on highways I had never traveled, camping to save

money along the way. This would take some planning. It was obvious I would need to front load some miles on this trip.

A couple of long days crossing the plains should do the trick.

Day one:

Friday, June 13th 1997, the first day of my journey had arrived. The morning was cool as I pulled the bike out of the garage and loaded my trip gear on to the bike. I had just finished loading as my friend Dave pulled into the drive. Dave wanted to see me off and had taken time off work so he could ride the first 100 miles with me that day. The bike felt heavy as I pushed it off the center stand. I lowered the side stand and kicked my right leg through the opening between my tank bag and camping gear bag. I pushed the choke on and hit the start button. The bike fired off right away and was idling smoothly in no time. Dave and I pulled out of the driveway and headed our bikes northwest. Once out of the city and on to the highway the sensation of added weight disappeared and I took each curve with greater confidence. I mentally congratulated myself for balancing the load well and keeping everything heavy over the wheels. We crossed the Wisconsin River still early in the morning and stopped for a coffee break after reaching Interstate 94. We took the coffee in to-go cups and walked back to the parking lot. We talked about the coming days while I busied myself checking the load. We soon were back on the Interstate traveling at higher speed. Dave and I leapfrogged each other a couple of times so Dave could get a look at how the load and the bike were riding at Interstate speed. A reassuring thumbs up and we settled into a comfortable run down the highway. About an hour later, Dave honked, waved and disappeared down a southbound exit. I was on my own for the rest of the ride to Anchorage.

The Red River was flooding in 1997 so after crossing the Mississippi River I followed Highway 94 to Jamestown, ND before catching HWY 52 north to Minot. Approaching Minot after dark on a two-lane highway I was nearly run off the road by a car that pulled out to pass an approaching car. Fortunately, there was a paved shoulder I could use to get out of the way but dodging on-coming traffic in the dark is a truly unsettling experience. A few miles down the road I found a campground. I pulled the bike in, selected an unused site and positioned the BMW at the opening. I have this fear of my tent being crushed by an RV operator that didn't see me there. I set up the tent by flashlight and happily crawled in with my sleeping bag. Gravity does a number on my muscles after sitting on a motorcycle for extended periods of time. That first horizontal stretch is so painfully wonderful it is hard to describe. End of the first day and I've covered 750 miles. It has been a good start. If I make Calgary tomorrow, everything else in my trip plan should fit comfortably.
